<u>Generation Wild</u> <u>Update</u>	Ms. Dempsey introduced the Sukle Advertising team who presented on the results of the winter Say Hi with a Snowman campaign and on the upcoming summer season campaign called Wilderflowers. Wilderflowers involves distributing wildflower seeds to encourage Coloradans and Generation Wild children to spread seeds to help make the state more diverse and beautiful to pollinators; the campaign will create billboards for promotion and distribute the Wilderflower packets at partner locations and local libraries.
Finance Update	Ms. Reeves updated the board on GOCO's finances as of December: current balance sheet, as well as the revenue and grant expenditures, lottery proceeds and projections, operating budget versus actuals, grants by purpose, and cash versus outstanding grants ratio for FY24 and FY25.

<u>Strategic Plan</u> <u>Topics: Trails,</u> <u>Urban &amp; Rural</u> <u>Investments</u>	Mr. Tenneson introduced two strategic plan situation analyses for discussion – Trails and Urban & Rural Investments. He showed the timeline of the strategic plan update process. GOCO has hired Collaborative Decision Resources (CDR) and Consensus Building Institute (CBI) to guide us through conversations and surveys with stakeholders. An additional request for proposals is currently outstanding for brand awareness. Ms. Kahler presented the Trails situation assessment, needs and future investments through

Mr. Yuan-Farrell discussed a partnership with Outside 285 Initiative, and how we can come together to protect trails for recreation and wildlife.</li> <li>Mr. Yuan-Farrell presented the situation assessment on urban versus rural investments: funding by geography, allocations between local government, open space, and parks &amp; wildlife, and the key takeaways.</li> </ul>

The CPW Investment Plan highlights include outdoor recreation and wildlife purpose funds for Parks Capital Program, Education &amp; Youth Programs, State Trails Program, and Acquisition of High Priority Habitat.</li> </ul>

Centennial Program Recommendations	<ul> <li>Mr. Yuan-Farrell introduced the regional officers and the partners of the Centennial program projects being recommended in their regions: Jefferson County's Peaks to Plains Trail; City of Rocky Ford's Arkansas Valley Fairgrounds &amp; Crystal Lake; High Line Canal Conservancy, Arapahoe County, City &amp; County of Denver, City &amp; County of Aurora's High Line Canal Community-Centered Improvements; Eagle County's Eagle Valley Trail; Statewide Natural Heritage Survey with Colorado State University; National Forest Foundation &amp; Chaffee County's Colorado 14ers Centennial Project; and Larimer County's Heaven's Door Ranch Acquisition.</li> <li>The presentation also highlighted previously awarded Centennial projects: The Conservation Fund &amp; Jefferson County's Mt. Tom Conservation Corridor; City of Colorado Springs' Wild Horse Ranch; and The Conservation Fund's Lost Canyon Ranch.</li> <li>Ms. Denahy asked for a vote on the Centennial program projects as presented; <i>Ms. Curtiss seconded.
